



RECREATION DEPARTMENT

In 2011, the Parks and Recreation Department offered excellent services for the public, providing over 130 programs, trips, activities and events for participants of all ages. During the summer, the Recreation Department entertains youngsters ages 5 to 12 with ten weeks of summer camps for a wide variety of interests, including sports, nature, theater and science. Camps run weekdays at the Horsham Township Community Center, Carpenter Park, Kohler Park and Deep Meadow Park.

TRADITIONS AND SPECIAL EVENTS

The Parks and Recreation Department was pleased to again be part of a number of popular Horsham Township traditions: Easter Egg Hunt, Annual Flea Market, Horsham Day, three summer concerts and Candy Cane Day. These events were well attended and the department looks forward to continued participation from the Township residents in the coming year. Horsham Day, the townships largest event, was very successful this year with very comfortable weather and an outpouring of support from both local businesses and residents. Horsham Day started off with businesses, nonprofits and restaurants taking center stage. Attendance stayed high throughout the day and ended with a huge crowd gathered to see the last performer, Shaken not Stirred, followed by one of the best firework shows hosted by Horsham Township.

PERMITS

In 2011, the Parks and Recreation Department amenities were widely utilized by the residents of Horsham Township. The townships parks and athletic facilities were booked nightly and on most weekends by our youth sport organizations and a few adult softball leagues. Pavilion rentals are in demand for birthday parties and other family events with the summer rentals being highly sought-after by our residents. We had three farmers who lease land from the township, farm portions of our open space. The Community Center was rented continuously throughout the year, with the majority of our rentals being weekend family events/gatherings. The recreation department works to fill the open time during the weekdays with its programs.

PARKS DEPARTMENT

The parks and trails throughout Horsham Township afford residents countless opportunities for outdoor recreation and enjoyment; enhancing our sense of community and well-being. We have created a balance of passive and active recreational opportunities for our residents to use and enjoy.

Horsham Township has 821.06 acres of parkland and open space: that includes public parks, a community center and an extensive trail system. Park amenities include playground equipment, sand volleyball, tennis courts, picnic pavilions and athletic fields for baseball, softball, soccer, lacrosse and football.

The Horsham Township Trail System has become an important part of what makes Horsham Township such an enjoyable place to live, work and raise a family. The goal of the trail system is to establish a bicycle and pedestrian network and to facilitate non-vehicular movement and provide ready access to locations such as parks, schools, the library, neighborhoods, retail centers and business parks for our residents.

In 2011, members of the Parks and Recreation Department worked hard to provide safe, clean and useable parks. The five-man crew maintains over 820 acres of land, including 16 parks, 31 open space areas and Township-owned detention basins. Their diligence and dedication resulted in many improvements and upgrades to the park system in 2011 including :

- New Whetstone Tot-lot play structure
- New walking trails, in Cedar Hill Road Park (Highway)
- Parking lot for Power Line Trail at Cedar Hill Road and Sawyers Way (Highway)
- Police Station Flower Beds and Stormwater Best Management Areas
- Deep Meadow Park Trail Stabilization project using terra cell matting
- Maple Basketball Court Paved (Highway)
- Horsham Library Bio Swale Trial: planted with Black Eyed Susan's
- Everybody's playground safety surfacing repair
- Cedar Hill Wetland Mitigation area (Assisted Highway)
- Established no-mow areas in couple of the parks. These areas help to improve water quality, trap pollutants, create wildlife habitat and reduce area of mowed lawn. Reduced mowing saves gas and money and protects the atmosphere





FINANCE DEPARTMENT



The Horsham Township Finance Department documents and handles incoming and outgoing cash flows. In 2011 this involved an operating budget of approximately \$13 million. The following information is a highlight, an overview of the year's most important financial activity:

- **Real Estate Tax** – Real estate taxes continue to comprise less than 10% of General Fund and Budget 2011 revenue. The average single family dwelling in 2011 was assessed at \$178,128 for a total municipal real estate tax of \$178.13. Of this amount, \$83.72 is raised for library services, \$55.22 for the Fire Company, and \$39.19 for parks and recreation. The real estate tax rate has been the same, 1 mill, since the enactment of the .47 mill library tax in 2002.
- **Library Debt** – A decade ago the voters of Horsham Township passed a referendum that enabled the borrowing of money to build a library. In 2002, the amount borrowed was \$6,500,000 at a rate of approximately 5.07%. Three years later, in 2005, it refinanced the remaining debt of \$6,380,000 at a rate of 4.07%. And in August 2011, the remaining debt of \$6,140,000 was again refinanced at a rate of 3.49%. The August refinancing resulted in the Township achieving approximately \$225,000 in savings! The new 2011 bonds have a five year call feature, meaning that five years from now we will have the ability to refinance again and obtain even more interest rate savings. The year of final maturity for the bond issue remains as 2032.
- The Finance Department is responsible for the accurate reporting of all revenue and expenditures of the Township. Throughout 2011, the department kept a vigilant eye on the budget, mindful of expenditures in light of the challenging economic climate.
- The township makes an ongoing effort to offset the cost of services with grant money that helps ease the tax burden for residents and, in some cases, improves services more quickly than ordinarily would be possible. Last year, several grants were awarded to offset the cost of services in the areas of public works, recreation and recycling.


The two charts below show how General Fund revenue was derived, and how it was expended in 2011. Note that more than half of all General Fund revenue was generated by Act 511 taxes such as the Earned Income Tax (EIT) and Local Services Tax (LST).

TAX DEPARTMENT

History of the Township Real Estate Tax Millage



All owners of taxable real property in Horsham Township (vacant land or residential, commercial, and other structures) are subject to a real estate tax each year. An owner of tax-exempt real property - such as a church, college, university, or public utility - generally is not subject to the real estate tax.

There are three taxing jurisdictions to which Horsham property owners pay the real estate tax: Horsham Township, Montgomery County and Hatboro-Horsham School District. The real estate tax is based on a millage rate levied each year by the respective governing bodies of those jurisdictions. For example, the Horsham Township real estate tax is set by the Township Council in December each year as part of the annual budget process and the School District tax is set each spring by the Hatboro-Horsham Board of School Directors.

Horsham Township levies an Earned Income Tax on its citizens and all non-residents who work in the Township. The rate is 1% of earned income. For 2011, the collection of this tax was handled by the outside firm, Berkheimer Associates. Many employers deduct this tax from employees' paychecks. In that case all you do is file an annual return by April 15th of each year. Contact Berkheimer directly at (800) 360-8989 to obtain forms or for information. 

The mission of the Fire Marshal's Office and its primary focus is to provide for the life safety of all those who live, work and visit Horsham Township through the strict enforcement of the township's fire and life safety codes and standards. Today's fire service not only responds to fire related incidents, but also to other emergencies such as hazardous materials incidents, vehicular & pedestrian accidents, weather and storm related events, environmental emergencies, and much more. The career staff and the volunteer force of the Horsham Fire Department responded to 753 fire and other emergency calls during the calendar year 2011.

The Fire Marshal of Horsham Township holds current and active certifications, issued by the International Code Council as Fire Inspector I, Fire Inspector II, Fire Plans Examiner, Certified Fire Code Official, Certified Fire Marshal and Master Code Professional. He also attends training seminars throughout the year in order to sharpen present skills as well as maintaining current and future certification levels.

INSPECTIONS

The Fire Marshal's Office conducts fire & life safety, permit and fire protection inspections periodically throughout the calendar year. These inspections are conducted to insure compliance with all township building, fire and life safety codes. Notices of Violations are issued for all identified violations with orders to remediate to code compliance.

INVESTIGATIONS

The Fire Marshal's Office investigates for cause and origin, all fires that occur within the municipal boundaries of Horsham Township. Fires that are determined incendiary or suspicious in nature are turned over to the Horsham Police Department's Criminal Investigative Division for further review and action. He also assists all local, county, state and federal law enforcement agencies in the prosecution of all arson related incidents.

FIRE PREVENTION ACTIVITIES

The Fire Marshal's Office conducts fire and emergency drills throughout the business community as well as all public and private schools and provides instruction and direction for proper and expedient mass evacuation of their buildings.

Along with the Horsham Fire Department, the Fire Marshal's Office is a participating agency with the ABC-6 Operation - Save a Life Program, and has distributed over 100 battery operated smoke detectors to township elderly and low-income residents who needed them.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Smoke Detectors: Smoke detectors save lives. Make sure that smoke detectors are installed on every level of your home and in each bedroom. Check their operation monthly by pressing the test button on the detector to insure they are working properly. Change the batteries twice a year to insure reliability. A good way to remember this is when we adjust our clocks for daylight saving time and again back to standard time. Remember, "Change your clocks - Change your batteries"

CO Detectors: Carbon monoxide is a colorless and odorless gas that can kill in minutes. Install CO detectors on each level of your home in the vicinity of your bedrooms. Also, like smoke detectors, check their operation monthly by pressing the test button on the detector to insure they are working properly. Change the batteries at the same time as your smoke detectors.

Cooking: Unattended cooking continues to be the number one cause of home fires. Grease and oil can ignite in minutes at high heat without ever coming into direct contact with flame. Never leave the kitchen when cooking with grease or oil.

Candles: While candles can provide an enhancement to your home décor, improper use can cause tragedy. Never leave children or pets alone with lighted candles and never leave them burning when exiting the room. Always place them on a firm and sturdy surface far away from flammable materials.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Emergency Management Team is comprised of high level command personnel representing Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Response personnel, Public Works and other municipal partners working under a unified Incident Command Structure to effectively deal with a man-made or natural disaster.

The Horsham Township Emergency Management Agency has developed and maintains a current municipal Emergency Operations Plan in conformance with the requirements outlined by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency and the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety. This plan is reviewed annually for accuracy and republished on a bi-annual cycle. This plan pre-assigns areas of responsibility to assist Horsham Township with preparing for, responding to and recovering from any disaster or crisis.

SPECIAL TRAINING

Members of the Horsham Township Emergency Management Administrative Team have earned and currently hold Basic, Advanced and Professional Level Certifications issued by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency. Members also participate in monthly scheduled training sessions with the Montgomery County Office of Emergency Preparedness in order to maintain current certifications as well as obtaining higher skill levels in emergency management practices.

EMERGENCY PLANNING

During 2011, the emergency management team updated our municipality's Emergency Operations Plan in accordance with the requirements and guidelines established by the Federal, State and Local Emergency Management Agencies. Members also attended various training seminars and classes throughout the year. The destructive actions of Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee mandated the opening of the township's Community Center to serve as an overnight temporary evacuation site and protective shelter for victims of the severe flooding. A total of 17 persons were sheltered overnight as a result of these two events. Additionally, two pet dogs were also housed overnight in the Horsham Township's Police dog kennel. These storms brought home the importance of emergency preparedness.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Safe Schools Committee: The Horsham Emergency Management Team has partnered with the Hatboro-Horsham School District in its safe schools initiative and is an active participant on the district's Safe Schools Committee. Table top and functional exercises have been conducted periodically in order to test our municipality's preparedness to effectively respond to and recover from any school crisis.

For the sixth consecutive year, the Department of Emergency Management partnered with the Horsham Soccer Association to coordinate life safety and security for the Colleen Reilly Soccer Tournament.

The Emergency Management Team also partnered with the Hatboro-Horsham Home and School Association and the Kid's Triathlon to provide similar services for their large scale events.

Emergency Management team members also responded to building and dwelling fires on Downey Drive, Easton Road, Latchstring Drive and Cedar Avenue providing assistance to the victims and helped begin the long process of recovery. The Emergency Management Team also responded to two biological hazard events and one environmental emergency during the calendar year of 2011 to coordinate the activities of local and county emergency response agencies.

Horsham Township is protected by a 40 member professional police force led by 39 year veteran Chief Robert Ruxton. The police department is complemented by its volunteer community police partners, Horsham ChATs (Chief's Advisory Teams).

The police department comprises three major division with specific areas of responsibilities for each division.

The patrol division is the largest unit and actively patrols all areas of the township 24 hours per day. The officers in the patrol division respond to calls for police services and provide traffic related duties, including enforcement activities.

The investigation division includes the juvenile and detective bureaus. These bureaus provide in depth investigation of criminal activities, as well as perform special investigations which are unique to juveniles.

The services division is composed of the records and communications bureaus. The communications bureau coordinates all radio and telephone services for the police department. The records bureau maintains the records of all traffic and police incidents which have been reported.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



Horsham Township is roughly 17 square miles, 89.70 miles of which are township roads. There are 23.72 miles of state roads and 1.5 miles of county roads.

The township boundaries are Route 63 (Welsh Road) to the west, Blair Mill Road to the south, County Line Road to the east and Lower State Road to the north between County Line Road and Horsham Road, and both sides of Lower State Road from Horsham Road to Welsh Road.

Responsibilities of the Highway Department includes:

- Cost-efficient maintenance of the Township's 89.70 miles of roads
- Overlay paving
- Full reconstruction of roadways
- Pothole patching
- Crack sealing
- Grading of shoulders
- Cleaning of roadside ditches
- Stormwater inlet repair
- Trimming trees past the curb line
- Roadside and intersection mowing
- Painting of traffic lines
- Repair and install signs
- Maintain all traffic, school & street lights
- Street sweeping
- Snow & ice control & removal
- Roadside litter cleanup
- Construction of walking trails
- Maintenance, state inspection and service on all township trucks, cars (including police cars) and equipment

ROAD REPAIR/MAINTENANCE

Horsham Township owns and maintains 89.70 miles of roadway. The cost for labor and materials to maintain the roads has increased tremendously in recent years. Each year the Highway Department performs roadway maintenance activities within the Township including:

- Major patching - Large portions of the roadway are cut out or milled out and replaced with new asphalt.
- Crack sealing - The Township has been using rubberized fibrous asphalt sealant with more body to fill and seal cracks in the roadway which lasts for many years.
- PA One calls to mark underground locations of Township owned facilities such as traffic loop detectors and storm sewer facilities. The Highway Department handled 1443 PA One calls this year.
- Highway crews repaired 121 potholes and sinkholes.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE

On going building maintenance at the garage included building a concrete wall around the magnesium tank. An outside contractor replaced two doors in the garage area; one overhead garage door and a pedestrian door. The building also had some ground rods installed to try and help protect the building and equipment during electrical storms.

The Highway Department has substantial knowledge and experience in all aspects of municipal building maintenance and are responsible for preventative maintenance, routine inspections and maintaining 5 Township buildings and also their exterior structures such as parking lot lights and signage.

EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE

The Department's two mechanics perform maintenance, state inspection and service on all township trucks, cars (including police cars) and equipment. In 2011, truck #18 was sent to auction and replaced with a 2011 International Truck.

TRAFFIC LIGHT & STREET LIGHT MAINTENANCE

The Highway Department coordinates repair of traffic lights, flashing warning lights and school zone lights using an outside contractor. The Department also is responsible for coordinating the repair of 404 Township owned streetlights through a consortium.

STORM SEWERS

The Highway Department repaired over 23 storm water inlets during 2011. This work included replacing storm sewer tops to rebuilding entire inlets.

SNOW REMOVAL

The Highway Department is also responsible for plowing the Township roadways and has an agreement with the State and County for taking care of snow removal on their roadways. Crews are also responsible for taking care of Township owned facilities, clearing snow from their parking lots and sidewalks. This past winter saw 12 substantial snowstorms, keeping the crews extremely busy trying to keep the roads in safe and passable condition during these events. The crews used 2,725 tons of salt and 300 gallons of magnesium chloride, keeping the streets free of snow and ice for residents and motorists passing through the Township during the winter season.

SUMMER STORMS

The members of the Highway Department were called upon to “go above and beyond” following Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee during the summer months. Flooding affected residents all over Horsham Township. Highway crews cleared debris from roadways and storm sewer inlets, set up signage and barricades. Crews also assisted in placing generators at the traffic signals that lost power.

STREET SWEEPING & ROADSIDE MOWING

Street sweeping starts in early spring and continues through the fall and winter (weather permitting). The continuation is to keep control of residue entering the storm inlets, basins and creeks (all part of MS4). In 2011, the street sweeper traveled over 11,198 miles and collected over 331.32 tons of debris with a disposal cost of \$27,447.40. The Highway Department also performed roadside mowing throughout the Township in open space areas.

TRAFFIC LIGHT IMPROVEMENTS

Highway Crews made an improvement to Dresher Road. The left turn lane heading northbound Route 611 was extended 300 feet. Signal Service then came in and made timing change as well as a flow change to the traffic light at Easton & Meetinghouse and Easton & Dresher Roads. Both left hand turn arrows went from unprotected to protected.

2011 PROJECTS

- The Highway Department completed the storm sewer project in the Woods Edge Development in preparation of the 2011 paving project. The following roads were milled and paved during this project: Butternut Drive, Holly Drive, Tamarack Circle, Red Gum, Cypress and Cottonwood. Along with the paving project, numerous curbs and handicap ramps went out to bid and work was completed in June.
- Several other Township roads were milled and stripped paved; Tennis Avenue, Babylon Road, Keith Valley Road and McKean Road.
- The Highway Department assisted the Parks Department with the connection of the main Powerline Trail at Cedar Hill Road to Lady Violet Drive. A parking lot was also constructed off of Cedar Hill Road. The crews also put a parking lot in off of Sawyers Way for Residents using the walking trail.
- The Highway Department also assisted the Parks Department with the resurfacing of the Basketball Court in Maple Park.

Horsham Township Library opened to the public on October 11, 2004 and provides free access to educational and recreational materials to all Horsham Township and Montgomery County residents. We are a member of Access Pennsylvania, which allows patrons to use any participating Pennsylvania library. We are also a charter member of MCLINC, a consortium of libraries that provides online, public access to Montgomery County library collections and Online Databases via library, home and office computers.

The library offers a collection of over 101,320 print and audio-visual items for both children and adults, housed in a 25,000 square foot building, with ample on-site parking. Meeting space for up to 183 people is available. The library features a coffee bar lounge where local residents can meet to exchange ideas.

The library schedules a variety of programs for children, teens and adults, such as:

- Weekly story time programs for babies, toddlers, and pre-school children
- Entertaining and educational after school programs for adolescents and teenagers
- Book discussion groups for all ages
- Lectures and cultural events for all ages

COLLECTIONS

The library's growing collection offers 90,313 books, 3,400 audiobooks, 1,884 music CDs, 5,467 DVDs, and a Morris Arboretum family pass to borrow. The library subscribes to twelve daily/weekly newspapers and 133 magazines. Online resources available to Horsham residents include nine databases purchased by Horsham Township Library, five purchased by the Montgomery District Library Center for all public libraries in the county, and the P.O.W.E.R. Library collection funded by the State Library of Pennsylvania.

The library began purchasing eBooks to supplement the down-loadable audiobooks and eBooks provided to the library district by the Montgomery County-Norristown Public Library. In December, The Friends of the Horsham Library sponsored the launch of a new collection of down-loadable eBooks called Axis360 for use on iPad's, Smartphones and tablet PCs running under the Android operating system. This digital part of the collection now has 255 downloadable eBooks and audiobooks in addition to the county-wide shared collection from OverDrive.

TECHNOLOGY

The library upgraded its photocopier/printer service, giving patrons the option of printing in either black & white or color.

The MCLINC consortium launched a subscription to the on-line library newsletter "Wowbrary" in August. Every Wednesday library patrons who subscribed at the website www.wowbrary.com received an email newsletter listing the library's new books and recordings.

CHILDREN & ADULT PROGRAMS

VITA Tax Assistance for low-income and elderly taxpayers was held from February 10 through April 14 to help taxpayers compile their returns and e-filed to speed receipt of refunds.

4-week sessions of “Giggle, Squiggle and Discover” Family Place parent/child workshops were held in the spring and fall. Twenty-five families participated in each session.

On April 8th Hatboro-Horsham High School senior Jaymie Kreiling organized an Open Mic Night at the library as a senior project. Library staff chaperoned while 40 student performers played to an audience of 150, displaying the terrific talent in our township.

The library screened the locally produced historical documentary film “The Battle of the Crooked Billet” May 24th followed by a question and answer session with the film’s producers and writers.

The library was a pick-up location for Lancaster Farm Fresh Cooperative Community Supported Agriculture program. About 30 people signed up to purchase full- or half-share boxes of produce or fruit delivered every Thursday during the summer and early autumn. Items not picked up by Friday morning were donated to the Food Bank at St. John’s Evangelical Lutheran Church in Hatboro.

The number of people participating in the 2011 Summer Reading Program was 47% higher than 2010! 1,218 participants included 162 preschool children (birth to age 5) in the “read-to-me” program, 574 children in grades K-5 in the independent reader program, 195 teens in grades 6-12, and 287 adults.

In September, Librarian Sandra Courtney added a second afternoon session to her popular book discussion group which meets the last Wednesday of each month.

Children’s librarian Ellyn Benner presented two special children’s programs during the break between regular story-time sessions. On October 27, Miss Ellyn presented a story and craft program in conjunction with a district-wide grant-funded project to educate young children about money. “Let’s Read Math” featured the story “Bennie’s Pennies,” with a penny bingo game and craft project where children decorated their own piggy bank. On Friday, October 28 Ellyn presented a special Halloween story-time and craft, followed by a trick or treating session. Children visited librarians dressed in costumes at stations throughout the library.

FRIENDS OF THE HORSHAM LIBRARY

Friends held a “Container Gardening” program with a tour of Kohler Farms greenhouse on April 16, courtesy of Pat Kohler.

The Mini-Golf fundraiser held March 5-6 drew 502 players. For this fun family event, the library became an indoor golf course with holes and prizes sponsored by local businesses.

“Celebrating Books Clubs II” Saturday, April 30 featured bestselling author Jennifer Weiner talking about her latest novel *Fly Away Home*. The audience of 160 learned about library resources, and played book-themed games.

In February and December, the Friends displayed the wares of local businesses at two holiday Shopping Events to give local small business people an opportunity to connect with customers while Friends of the Horsham Library raised funds to support library programs.

Friends organized a series of programs on financial topics featuring local business and banking executives. “World of Finance in our Challenging Economy,” “Learn More About Our Economy & How to Succeed in the Workplace,” and “The Economy, Our Government and You” addressed many of the issues and concerns raised by the banking and financial crisis that triggered the “great recession.”

CODE ENFORCEMENT

The mission of the Department of Code Enforcement is to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of life within our community by performing plan reviews and inspecting the construction and modification of all new and existing buildings and structures for conformity with the PA State Act # 45, the Uniform Construction Code and Horsham Township Ordinances.

In compliance with the PA State Act # 45, the Uniform Construction Code and Horsham Township Ordinances, the Department of Code Enforcement is organized into three primary areas; Commercial Construction, Residential Construction and Existing Structures. The Commercial Construction program inspects all commercial construction activities governed under the PA Uniform Construction Code which adopts, by reference, the recently updated International Construction Codes and referenced standards. The Residential Construction program inspects all residential construction activities governed under the PA Uniform Construction Code which adopts, by reference, the recently updated International Construction Codes and referenced standards.

The Director of Code Enforcement for Horsham Township is a Certified Master Code Professional by the International Code Council, holding PA State Uniform Construction Code certifications in all residential and commercial inspection categories.

Members of the Department of Code Enforcement attended a variety of training seminars hosted by the PA Construction Codes Academy, the PA Association of Code Officials, the International Code Council and other nationally recognized agencies throughout the calendar year in order to attain additional PA State Certifications as well as obtaining the necessary continuing education credits in order to maintain current certification levels.

The Department of Code Enforcement also participated in the PA Department of Labor & Industry Accessibility Audit, whereby a representative of the PA Department of Labor & Industry inspected three randomly chosen properties to determine whether inspectors were properly enforcing the accessibility provisions and requirements of the PA Uniform Construction Code.

The Building Inspector and the Code Enforcement Officer holds evening hours at the municipal complex specifically for our residential community on the 2nd Tuesday of each month from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM, to answer zoning questions and address construction concerns for residential modifications, additions and alterations.
