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Dear Horsham Township Residents:

On behalf of Horsham Council, I am pleased to present the 2014 Annual Report, providing some of the highlights and significant accomplishments from the past year.

Members of Township Council are aware of the need to retain the quality of life that has made Horsham home to more than 26,000 people and literally hundreds of businesses both large and small. It is for that reason that Council and its professional staff have elevated transportation and traffic management to priority status.

Horsham Township is currently partnering with Montgomery County’s Planning Commission and surrounding townships on the Turnpike Corridor Reinvestment Project with a goal to make access to the Turnpike more convenient. Improvements to the Turnpike Interchanges at Willow Grove and Fort Washington, combined with a new slip ramps at PA Route 63 (Welsh Road) will improve traffic flow south of the Township which will benefit workers and residents alike.

Horsham Township is also currently working with PA’s Department of Transportation on its Route 611 Corridor Study. The goal is to provide a complete network of roadways, linked to mass transit and bicycle/pedestrian facilities, to help alleviate congestion along PA Route 611 from the Philadelphia County Line north to Doylestown by developing a ‘best fit’ transportation network.

It seems a recap of any year in Horsham Township is not complete without mention of the weather and 2014 is no exception. The Township – and the entire Northeast - was hit with a one-two punch in February when two storms hit back to back.. The combination of heavy rain, ice and snow resulted in countless downed trees and limbs resulting in 75% of the Township being without power for days. With residents facing an overwhelming cleanup task, the Township’s Emergency Management Department, Public Works Department, Fire Company, Police Department, Parks Department and countless community volunteers stepped in and provided much-needed assistance to the community. The response by our emergency personnel was impeccable and I cannot thank them enough for their service!

I encourage everyone to continue reading through this Annual Report to see all the other wonderful happenings in Horsham throughout the past year. Myself, along with my fellow Council Members are truly honored to serve such a wonderful community and we will work hard to maintain its excellence.

Manager's Message

Energy Management

At Horsham Township's Monday, March 24th Council Meeting Horsham Township was recognized by Barry Seymour, Executive Director, Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) for being a Municipal Leader in Energy Efficiency. Horsham Township participated in DVRPC's Direct Technical Assistance Program provided by an Energy Efficiency Circuit Rider Project Grant. As a Direct Technical Assistance Community, Horsham Township has demonstrated leadership among municipalities in southeastern Pennsylvania by taking important steps towards implementation of cost-effective measures to reduce its energy use. By doing so, Horsham Township has ensured sustainability and cost saving measures for its residents and has served the region by contributing its time and expertise, helping DVRPC develop a program that will support leadership in energy management for other municipalities in the region.

Record Breaking Winter

The Township went above and beyond in its efforts before, during and after the snow storms dubbed "Maximus" and "Nika" by the National Weather Service that hit Horsham Township on February 3 and February 5, 2014. When we talk about this past winter, we tend to remember it in terms of the 80 inches of snow or days spent in subzero temperatures. But what we tend to forget is the man hours, materials and wear and tear on equipment it takes to keep our streets clean and our residents safe.

The storms were the second-worst in PECO's history in terms of loss of power. The 8 inches of heavy wet snow that fell on Monday, topped by the ice storm overnight on Tuesday proved too much for trees, utility poles and power lines. Horsham had numerous road closures mostly involving downed power lines that the township highway department couldn't deal with until PECO workers secured them.

As of Wednesday, February 5, 2014, trees had fallen on homes and roadways, causing power outages to more than three-quarters of the township. The Hatboro-Horsham School District, to the chagrin of some parents, could not open schools due to power outages. The Horsham Library welcomed residents to come to the library for "warmth, lights, and outlets for recharging electronic devices.

The various Township Department heads and their employees should be commended for the efforts put forth by each and every one of them. They dealt with aspects of this emergency and responded to the challenge with a massive effort. Township employees continued to work knowing that their families were at home experiencing loss of power and under the ongoing threat of trees and wires coming down on their homes.

Horsham Named a Top City on the Rise in Pennsylvania

Horsham ranked seventh in the fastest-growing cities in Pennsylvania due to the increase of population, employment, and income growth. It has been quoted that Horsham has weathered the recession very well, and recent figures indicate that its economic incline is likely to continue. Horsham has also been recognized with best place to buy a home due to homeownership rate, selected monthly homeowner cost, monthly household income, and population growth.

Horsham Takes Top Honors in Pennsylvania

The top honor award is given to one township for its overall achievement and commitment to citizen communication. Horsham Township won the top honor and four awards by the State of Pennsylvania during the State Association Annual Outstanding Citizen Communication Contest (PSATS). The Township won 1st place in best website category, 2nd place in the most improved newsletter, 3rd place in the Annual Reports category, and 3rd place in the other publication category (new resident handbook).

Finance Department

The mission of the Finance Department is to effectively manage and safeguard all financial resources in order for the municipality to adequately fund and maintain public facilities and desired services. In 2014, this involved a General Fund Budget of approximately \$15.1 million, and a total budget of more than \$32 million. Despite an ongoing recovery from a challenging economic time period, prudent fiscal management led to projected expenditures being less than budgeted. The department strives to meet the high standard of fiscal responsibility set forth by Township Council.

Horsham Township Council held the line on taxes once again. Horsham residents saw no change to the municipal tax rate in the adopted 2014 budget. The Township real estate tax has remained at one mill for many consecutive years. Horsham has the lowest tax rate in eastern Montgomery County and has the sixth lowest rate out of the 62 municipalities in Montgomery County.



REAL ESTATE TAX

All owners of taxable real property in Horsham Township are subject to a real estate tax each year. The real estate tax is based on a millage rate levied yearly by the respective governing bodies. These taxes are remitted to three jurisdictions: Horsham Township, Montgomery County and Hatboro-Horsham School District.

Real estate taxes continue to comprise less than 10% of General Fund revenue. The one mill real estate tax equals \$1 for every \$1,000 of assessed value on a property. The owner of a home assessed at the municipal approximate average of \$178,371 will pay \$178.37, of that \$83.83 will be for the Library, \$55.30 will be for the Fire Company and \$39.24 will go towards Parks and Recreation. None of the real estate tax millage is allocated for the general administration of local government.

LIBRARY DEBT

In August, 2011, Horsham Township refinanced the remaining debt and realized a savings of \$225,000. The year of final maturity for the bond issue remains at 2032 and the unpaid principal at the end of 2014 was \$5,615,000.

HORSHAM DAY

The activities at the 2014 Annual Horsham Day had a little something for everybody, but there was one new attraction that no one wanted to miss. The JCB Dancing Diggers from Earthborne Trucking in Warrington put on an hourly show at Carpenter Park that wowed the crowd each time. With a soundtrack of classic rock and roll from Aerosmith and AC/DC, four drivers managed to make large, lumbering pieces of construction equipment look downright graceful. At one point, the two backhoes propped up on their shovels as two tractor-sized earth movers buzzed underneath the towering machinery.



Fishing Contest

Besides the Dancing Diggers, Deep Meadow Park, Kohler Park and Carpenter Park also hosted a 5K run/walk followed by a youth fishing contest, 100 vendor tents with food and games, a wide selection of bounce houses for the kids, live music on the main stage featuring local bands and musicians from Hatboro-Horsham High School and much more. A classic car show and volleyball and basketball tournaments, while across the street the Horsham Fire Co. invited guests to an open house as well as pony rides and a petting zoo. The activity-filled day was a fitting prelude to the main event, a spectacular fireworks show at 9 p.m.

FREEZER 5K RUN & 1 MILE FUN WALK

The Recreation Department held its 3rd annual Freezer 5K and 1 Mile Family Fun Walk on December 14, 2014 with over 520 participants. There were pre and post-race activities for the whole family including entertainment, DJ, giveaways and more. The event was a collaboration of several area business owners and public servants who wanted to create an event which would directly benefit the Horsham community. Parks Department

A BIG WELCOME TO OUR NEW PARK SUPERINTENDANT

Rick Lutz has joined the staff of Horsham Township as Parks Superintendent. Mr. Lutz has over twenty five years of experience in responsible roles within the Parks Department at several municipalities around the United States. His experience is enhanced by his multiple Parks and Recreation certifications followed by a Masters Degree. Mr. Lutz's experience and education will be an immense contribution to the Horsham Township Parks Department.

KOHLER PARK REVITALIZATION PROJECT

Through strategic planning and cooperative efforts, multiple enhancements were completed in Kohler Park in 2014. The Horsham Rotary Club contributed \$150,000 well as the DCNR awarding the Township a \$75,000 grant towards a new playground and picnic pavilion. The playground and picnic pavilion were open to the public in the summer and the restrooms were completed over the winter months.

In addition to Council securing an additional 10.59 acres of open space for Kohler Park as part of the land development with Toll Brothers Horsham Estate Development they agreed to construct the paved connection of the Powerline Trail between Babylon Road and Limekiln Pike, install paved connections from the trail to the dog park and clear/grade an area of land for future recreational use. More importantly, Council worked with Toll Brothers to coordinate the renovation of the Kohler Park pond with bank stabilization through installation of a stone wall perimeter. The pond project was completed in spring, 2014. With the additional acreage, Kohler Park will be a total of 82.01 acres.

Through Township partnerships with the DCNR Horsham Rotary and Toll Brothers, these substantial improvements show how the Horsham community both public and private came together to benefit our community.

Horsham Township residents are fortunate to have one of the largest park systems in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. The Horsham park system contains more than 821 acres in 47 sites ranging from community parks to neighborhood parks to open space and 14 miles of trails to enjoy.

PARK SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

While many may go to a park to enjoy their day away from work, the Township's park crews go into the parks daily to do their work. On any given day there are crews from the parks division mowing, emptying trash, grooming athletic fields, tending to the trails, inspecting sites for safety hazards and making repairs and upgrades to Township parks as well as supporting dozens of athletic events and picnics at sites throughout the Township. If you haven't visited a park recently, make some time to enjoy the wonderful sites employees of Horsham Township Parks division are proud to maintain.

PERMITS

In 2014, the Parks and Recreation Department amenities were widely utilized by the residents of Horsham Township. The townships parks and athletic facilities were booked nightly and on most weekends by our youth sport organizations and a few adult softball leagues. Pavilion rentals are in demand for birthday parties and other family events with the summer rentals being highly sought-after by our residents. We had two farmers who lease land from the township, the Hearne Tract and the Strawbridge property.

The mission of the Fire Marshal's Office and its primary focus is to provide for the life safety of all those who live, work and visit Horsham Township through the strict enforcement of the township's fire and life safety codes and standards. Today's fire service not only responds to fire related incidents, but also to other emergencies such as hazardous materials incidents, vehicular & pedestrian accidents, weather and storm related events, environmental emergencies, and much more.

The career staff and the volunteer force of the Horsham Fire Department responded to 672 fires and other emergency calls during the calendar year 2014. Additionally, the fire department responded to the requests from the Horsham Ambulance Company for manpower assistance on numerous medical calls throughout the year.

INSPECTIONS & INVESTIGATIONS

The Fire Marshal's Office performed approximately 289 inspections in 2014. These inspections are conducted to insure compliance with all township building, fire and life safety codes. Notices of Violations are issued for all identified violations with orders to remediate to code compliance. The Fire Marshal's Office investigates for cause and origin, all fires that occur within the municipal boundaries of Horsham Township. Fires that are determined incendiary or suspicious in nature are turned over to the Horsham Police Department's Criminal Investigative Division for further review and action. He also assists all local, county, state and federal law enforcement agencies in the prosecution of all arson related incidents.

FIRE MARSHAL

The Fire Marshal of Horsham Township holds current and active certifications, issued by the International Code Council as Fire Inspector I, Fire Inspector II, Fire Plans Examiner, Certified Fire Code Official, Certified Fire Marshal and Master Code Professional. He also attends training seminars throughout the year in order to sharpen present skills as well as maintaining current and future certification levels.

FIRE STATION OPEN HOUSE & NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The Fire Department participated in the third Horsham Township National Night Out by allowing residents to sit in fire trucks, handed out fire prevention literature and performed a Jaws of Life demonstration for the crowd. The Fire Department also celebrated National Fire Prevention Week in October by hosting an annual open house on Horsham Road with activities, events and information aimed at promoting a better understanding of how to prevent fires and fire hazards.

HORSHAM FIRE COMPANY CELEBRATES 100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Over the past 100 years, the men and women of the Horsham Fire Company have faithfully served and protected the citizens of our community. Company members are as dedicated today as our founders were in 1914 to live up to our mission statement "to provide our residents with the best possible fire prevention and fire protection services in Horsham Township."



Today, Horsham Fire Company lists 30 members responding from Battalion 1, located on Meetinghouse Road and another 10 members at Battalion 2, located on Horsham Road. In addition, Horsham Fire Company Ambulance lists 10 members on its roster, with another 10 people belonging to the Special Fire Police and approximately 12 members of the Auxiliary. These volunteers respond to hundreds of calls annually ranging from fire emergencies to gas leaks and car accidents. Additionally, volunteers participate in weekly training sessions to keep apprised of new procedures and techniques for handling emergencies.



Emergency Management

The Horsham Township Office of Emergency Management team consists of the Township Fire Marshal, the Police Department, Horsham Fire Company, Emergency Medical Response personnel, Public Works and other municipal partners. Together, the various departments and individuals have over 100 years of combined emergency management experience.

The Township Fire Marshal is the designated Municipal Emergency Management Coordinator for Horsham Township. Emergency Management is that function of Township Government responsible for coordinating our community's response to a major emergency. The Emergency Management Organization is NOT a replacement for, or an addition to police, fire, rescue, public works or other response units, but a system for coordinating and managing various municipal, volunteer and private resources to effectively prepare for, respond to and recover from a community crisis.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

During 2014, an annual review of our municipal emergency operations plan was conducted in conformance with the Federal, Pennsylvania and County Emergency Management Agencies' requirements. Additionally, members of the emergency management team attend monthly training sessions at the Montgomery County Office of Emergency Preparedness in order to sharpen skills and maintain certification levels. Present members hold Pennsylvania Emergency Management Certifications at the Professional level.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

With snowstorm after snowstorm and the subzero temps of the polar vortex, 2014 certainly felt like a record-breaking winter for the Emergency Management Department. Horsham Township's Emergency Management Department activated the Community Center as a warming center on February 4, 2014 after a one-two winter punch. The warming center was made available to any township resident as a place to seek relief from the cold due to so many residents being without power and a source of heat for their homes. The Red Cross of Southeastern Pennsylvania opened an overnight shelter at the Hatboro-Horsham High School on Wednesday, February 5, 2014.

We continue to explore opportunities for robust and comprehensive communication. During the many winter storms, we were able to send out e-mail updates through Township E-news Notifications, post information on our website, send out Ready Notify PA emergency alerts, update the Government Access TV Channels (Verizon channel 32 and Comcast 22) and provide information via Horsham ChATs Facebook page.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

At the August 5, 2014 Horsham Township National Night Out, the Office of Emergency Management handed out Emergency Preparedness information from the township as well as PECO and www.ReadyPA.org.



The mission of the Horsham Township Police Department is to provide professional law enforcement service to Horsham Township. To preserve, protect and enhance the quality of life for the people of Horsham through a broad range of police services. The officers that make up the Horsham Police Department are dedicated and committed to ensure Horsham is a safe place to raise a family, work and enjoy life.

NEW CHIEF OF POLICE SWORN IN

Chief of Police Robert Ruxton retired in January 2014 ending a 41-year career with the Horsham Township Police Department. Deputy Chief William Daly was promoted to Chief of Police on January 8, 2014 at the Township Council meeting after Chief Robert Ruxton officially retired. Bill Daly officially moved up from Deputy Chief to Police Chief on January 20, 2014.

Daly, a U.S. Air Force veteran who started his career with the Horsham Police in 1987, rose through the ranks and was named Sergeant in 1998 and Lieutenant in 2004 before being appointed the department's first Deputy Chief in 2013. Daly is the fourth police chief since the department's inception in the 1950s.

DRUG DROP BOX

The Horsham Police Department has a new addition to the lobby of the police station, a drop box to collect unused and out-of-date medications and prescriptions for proper disposal. The collection box is accessible 24 hours a day and allows our residents to drop off their unwanted medications. Many teens abusing medicines get them from the bathroom cabinet, a friend or a family member, often without their knowledge. Unwanted medicines left in the home endanger our children, seniors, and pets by putting them at risk of accidental poisoning. Young children and seniors are at risk of accidental poisoning. Flushing drugs send them into our water supplies while throwing them in the trash pollute our environment and can find their way into unwanted hands. In 2014, 114 pounds were collected in the new drop box.

POLICE DEPARTMENT ACCREDITATION

The Horsham Township Police Department received accreditation from the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission beginning in 2003 as one of the first townships to be accredited in Pennsylvania. Since then, the Police Department has completed a reassessment in 2006, 2009 and 2012. We will undergo re-assessment in 2015. Currently, there are only 96 police departments state accredited out of over 1,200 police departments in Pennsylvania.





Police Department

The Horsham Police Department is comprised of 40 men and women that are supported by a 7 member dispatch and clerical staff. In addition to our main duties, patrol and investigation, we provide a wide range of community policing services to include: Citizens Police Academy, ChAT's, DARE and National Night Out. 24/7/365 days a week, come rain, sleet, snow or shine, the Horsham Police work to ensure that our residents live in a safe environment where work and play are the major issues of the day.

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The mission of the Department of Code Enforcement is to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of life within our community by performing plan reviews and inspecting the construction and modification of all new and existing buildings and structures for conformity with the PA State Act # 45, the Uniform Construction Code and Horsham Township Ordinances.

George Fida, the Director of Code Enforcement for Horsham Township is a Certified Master Code Professional by the International Code Council, holding PA State Uniform Construction Code certifications in all residential and commercial inspection categories. He also serves as the municipality's Building Code Official with the PA Department of Labor & Industry.

In compliance with the PA State Act # 45, the Uniform Construction Code and Horsham Township Ordinances, the Department of Code Enforcement is organized into the following three primary areas; Commercial Construction, Residential Construction and Existing Structures.

- Commercial Construction program inspects all commercial construction activities governed under the PA Uniform Construction Code which adopts, by reference, the recently updated International Construction Codes and referenced standards.
- Residential Construction program inspects all residential construction activities governed under the PA Uniform Construction Code which adopts, by reference, the recently updated International Construction Codes and referenced standards.
- Horsham Township is currently under contract with Code Inspections, Inc. for the performance of the required plan reviews and building inspections under the Uniform Construction Code.

Highway Department Fleet

The Highway Department maintains the Township’s 91.21 miles of roadways, completing salting and plowing operations, potholes and crack repairs, tree trimming and street sweeping. It is the responsibility of the Highway Department to maintain the Township’s storm sewers, street lights and traffic signals/flashing lights. Its crew members complete building, equipment and vehicle maintenance. Additionally, the department provides timely response to a wide-range of residents’ request for service.

RECORD BREAKING WINTER FOR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

With the snow storms just in January and February alone, a 130-year-old record was shattered. For the first time in the region’s history, there were four 6+ inch snowfalls or more in a season. In addition, 2014 is now in the top 5 snowiest winters of all-time.

It was a very demanding winter for the entire region, and the storms with heavy wet snow were a particular challenge to municipal workers and residents alike who had to heft the heavy shovels of flakes. With 91.21 miles of roads to maintain, the Horsham Township Highway Department crews worked around the clock on several occasions.

One of the stressful issues this winter was the depleting supply of road salt in the region. At least three times, Horsham had only enough salt left on site for one more application of Township roads; other municipalities were in the same situation. Working with our supplier and other communities, the Township Highway Superintendent was able to scavenge enough salt to safely meet each storm. The winter of 2014 will long be remembered.

SNOW REMOVAL

The Highway Department is also responsible for plowing the Township roadways and has an agreement with the State and County for taking care of snow removal on their roadways. Crews are also responsible for taking care of Township owned facilities, clearing snow from their parking lots and sidewalks. This past winter saw several major snowstorms, keeping the crews busy trying to keep the roads in safe and passable condition during these events. The crews used 3265 tons of salt keeping the streets free of snow and ice for residents and motorist passing through the Township during the winter season.

ROAD REPAIR/MAINTENANCE

The cost for labor and materials to maintain 91.21 miles of roads has increased tremendously in recent years. Each year the Highway Department performs roadway maintenance activities within the Township including major patching of the roadways, crack sealing and PA One calls to mark underground locations of Township owned facilities such as traffic loop detectors and storm sewer facilities.

- The Highway Department handled 1,545 PA One calls this year.
- Highway crews repaired 95 potholes and sinkholes.

EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE

The Department’s two mechanics perform maintenance, state inspection and service on all township trucks, cars (including police cars) and equipment.

TRAFFIC LIGHT AND STREET LIGHT MAINTENANCE

The Highway Department coordinates repair of traffic lights, flashing warning lights and school zone lights using an outside contractor. The Department also is responsible for coordinating the repair of 404 Township owned streetlights through a consortium. This year 63 LED street lights were installed in Meetinghouse Village and numerous other locations replacing the mercury lamps and incandescent lights.

STORM SEWERS

The Highway Department repaired over 34 storm water inlets during 2014. This work included replacing storm sewer tops to rebuilding entire inlets.

STREET SWEEPING

Street sweeping starts in early spring and continues through the fall and winter (weather permitting). The continuation is to keep control of residue entering the storm inlets, basins and creeks (all part of MS4). In 2014 the street sweeper traveled over 2080 hours and collected over 158 tons of debris with a disposal cost of \$12,798.20. The Highway Department also performed roadside mowing throughout the Township in open space areas.

2014 PROJECTS

- Milling and paving Park Rd , Mckean Rd, and Cedar Hill Rd.
- Several other Township roads were milled and stripped paved throughout the year. They were as follows: Babylon Rd., Tennis Ave., Country Rd., Maple Ave., Meetinghouse Rd., and Herman Rd.
- Installed storm drain inlets and piping to improve stormwater management in certain areas of the Horsham Terrace neighborhood along a portion of Jefferson Avenue, Watson Avenue and Broadway Avenue. These improvements will assist in mitigating the flooding problems and reduce homeowner exposure to unforeseen costs related to the impacts of the flood waters.
- Storm inlets and pipes were installed on Cedar Hill Road.
- Bridge work completed at Saw Mill Lane over Pennypack Creek.
- The Highway Department installed a trail between the firehouse and Kohler Park.
- Grant money received from the county was used to purchase 5 generators and a message board.

2014 Recognitions

- The Montgomery County Public Works Association trade show was held on October 16,2014 at the Horsham Highway Department. The Township was presented with a plaque in recognition for their continued support of the trade show.

Horsham Library Babylon Road

The Horsham Library provides the highest quality library services to its patrons of all ages. The materials, programs and information services and facility meet community needs for education, recreation and cultural enrichment.

The library is able to meet the public's needs due to the dedicated support of many people: A 5-person volunteer Board, the Library Director, and 5 full-time and 16 part-time employees who staff the library's 56½ hours of operation per week. Finally, the dedicated Friends of the Horsham Library provide program and financial support.

The library offers a collection of over 108,000 print and audio-visual items for both children and adults, housed in a 25,000 square foot building, with ample on-site parking. Meeting space for up to 183 people is available. The library features a coffee bar lounge where local residents can meet to exchange ideas.

A BIG WELCOME TO OUR NEW REFERENCE LIBRARIAN

Erin Halovanic joined the library's staff in mid-July to fill Sandy Courtney's shoes who moved to Buffalo New York in August, 2014. Erin, a resident of Towamencin Township, brings experience with library system networking and college library reference and administration to her new position as Horsham's go-to person for information.

INFORMATION ACCESS

Library cardholders can access the library from home at www.horshamlibrary.com by using their library card barcode number. The Horsham Library holds membership in the Montgomery County Library and Information Network Consortium (MCLINC). This allows us to share materials with most other libraries in the county. Public internet access currently is available through a wireless Hotspot and at 27 dedicated workstations that offer Microsoft Office Pro 2013 (courtesy of a grant from the Horsham Industrial Development Authority) and Adobe Photoshop software. Black & white and color printing from all 27 public computers is available at 20¢ per page.

In the span of 10 years, the Horsham Library has had...

- Welcomed 1,056,186 visitors
- Loaned over 3.3 Million books and audio-visual items
- Answered 31,409 reference questions
- Logged computer users on to public Internet computers for a total of 205,073 hours
- Held 1,519 story times for babies, toddlers and pre-school age children.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS AND SPECIAL EVENTS

The Children's department, under the dynamic leadership of "Miss Ellyn" Benner, has brought a tremendous energy to the Library. The Children's Department offered 154 story time programs to over 4,132 children and parents. Story times for babies, toddlers and pre-school age children help develop early literacy skills and get children ready for more formal learning in school. Thursday evening "Twilight Tales" family story times offer working parents an opportunity to enjoy stories, songs and rhymes with children of all ages.

Twice a year the library offers a 4-week series of "Giggle, Squiggle, and Discover" programs for parents and their pre-school children. While children play with sturdy, age appropriate educational toys, parents "network" with each other and talk with experts from local agencies about child-rearing and child development questions. The program emphasizes parents' role as their children's first teacher and the importance of play to the development of children's motor skills, language and understanding of basic concepts.

The Children's Easter Monday program featuring Elsa of Arendelle, from the new Disney hit movie "Frozen" was an overwhelming success. Over 200 children and their parents came for photos and autographs with the newest Disney princess. About 80 people stayed to watch the movie and enjoy popcorn. Friends of the Horsham Library underwrote the cost of the performer's honorarium and refreshments for the movie.

The Summer Reading Program (for all ages from babies through adults) encourages readers to exercise their reading skills during summer vacation. A great way for students to keep their reading skills fresh between semesters and for parents to be a reading role-model for their children, The 2014 Summer Reading Program had 690 participants from birth through fifth grade, 243 teens/tweens, and 246 adults.

Science in the Summer, funded by the GlaxoSmithKline Company, offered 32 children entering grades 2 through 6 the chance to learn about Chemistry through hands-on "lab" activities at the library.


HORSHAM LIBRARY 10TH ANNIVERSARY
